Northwestern Oklahoma State University's department of social work has received a \$1,000 gift from the Potts Family Foundation out of Oklahoma City.

Dr. Kylene Rehder, social work department chair and professor of social work, said that the funds from this gift will provide continued support for a focus on infant mental health in the curriculum. The department also will be able to use the funds to join the Oklahoma Association for Infant Mental Health, which promotes awareness, understanding and excellence in infant and early childhood mental health through education, workforce development, multi-disciplinary collaboration and advocacy for best practices.

Rehder added that the department is honored to be supported by the Potts Family Foundation, whose mission is to provide support for sustainable early childhood initiatives and nonprofit capacity building.

"The social work program is focused on developing professionals able to support the healthy social-emotional development of infants, toddlers and their families," Rehder said.

3 EDUCATIONAL DEGREE OPTIONS

Choose your level of education based on your career goals. Be sure to enroll in a social work program accredited by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE).

Bachelor's in Social Work (BSW)

Required for entry-level non-clinical positions
Includes supervised fieldwork or internship



Master's in Social Work (MSW)

Typically required for clinical positions
1-2 years to complete
Includes supervised practicum or internship



Doctorate in Social Work (DSW)

Often required for teaching at university level, high-level programs and systems management positions
Includes advanced training in research, supervision and policy analysis



State Licenses

Required for clinical positions (and non-clinical positions in some states)
Need MSW and hours of supervised clinical work post-graduation
Must pass licensure exam

SENIOR AWARDED CWPEP STIPEND



Northwestern Oklahoma State University's Department of Social Work announces Northwestern-Woodward senior Carolyn Reaves of Fort Supply as the stipend recipient of the Child Welfare Professional Enhancement Program (CWPEP) for the 2022-2023 academic year. CWPEP provides funds for students who plan careers in child welfare services in Oklahoma. The stipends are awarded to full-time students majoring in social work and provide money toward educational expenses to participating students. Students who receive the stipends complete educational internships in child welfare agencies within the Oklahoma Department of Human Services (OKDHS). Upon graduation, students are assured employment in the participating DHS programs.

"I'm thrilled to have this opportunity to advance my professional skills in the area of child welfare," Reaves said. "A career to make a real difference in the lives of children and families is the reason I went into social work."

CWPEP is a Title IV-E partnership between the University of Oklahoma, the Oklahoma Department of Human Services, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Administration for Children and Families Council, and Social Work Education (CSWE) in accredited social work programs in Oklahoma.

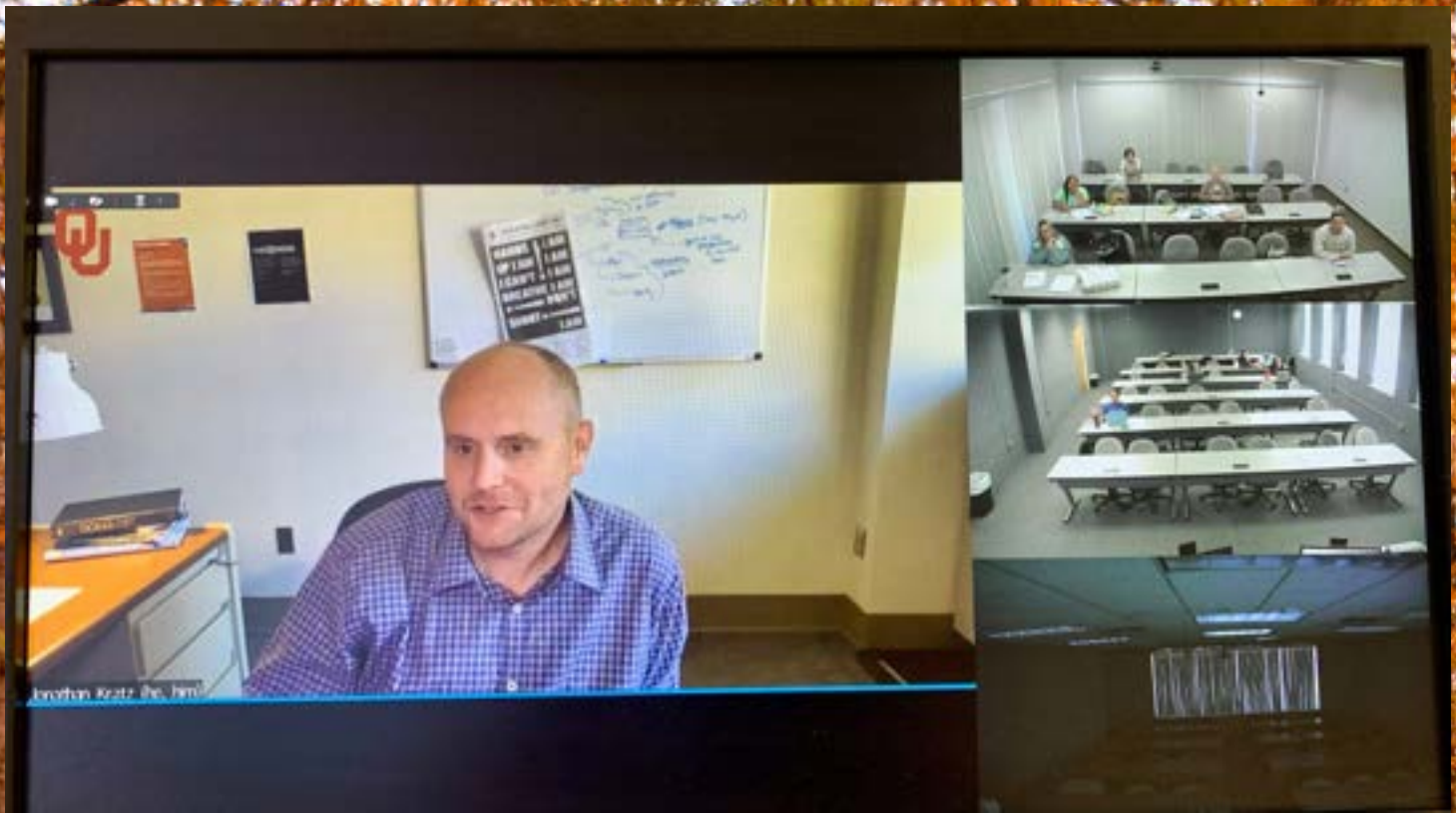
The University of Oklahoma manages the child welfare consortium. Other partners along with Northwestern include East Central University and Oral Roberts University. Funding for the educational program is provided by Title IV-E of the social security act, called the Child Welfare Training program.

"The social work program is proud to administer the CWPEP program and play an essential role in securing and retaining quality social workers in the public child welfare system," Dr. Kylene Rehder, department of social work chair, CWPEP coordinator, and professor of social work, said. "CWPEP at Northwestern has graduated 21 students, resulting in more than \$160,000 being awarded in educational assistance."

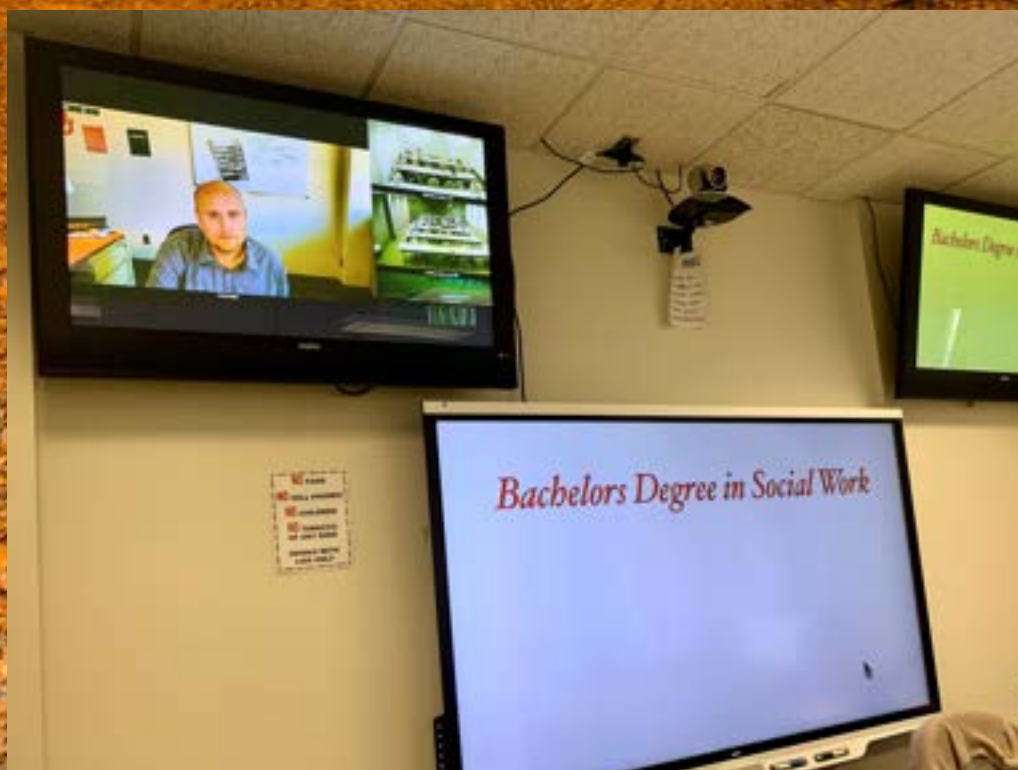

BRAD HENRY INTERNATIONAL SCHOLAR



Northwestern Oklahoma State University junior social work major April Schultz has been selected as a Brad Henry International Scholar by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education.

The Alva native will spend the spring 2023 semester studying at Swansea University in Swansea, Wales, United Kingdom.

"I am beyond excited to be the recipient of this scholarship," Schultz said. "It is such an amazing opportunity that I never could have dreamed of. I cannot wait to experience the culture in Wales and be able to tie that experience into my social work education that I have received here at Northwestern. I am grateful to have been chosen as the Brad Henry Scholar."

Schultz was nominated by Dr. Kylene Rehder, department of social work chair and professor of social work. She will receive funding for tuition and lodging for a full semester of study at Swansea University, as well as a stipend to help with other expenses such as airfare and passport fees to and from the UK.

"Northwestern is pleased to congratulate Ms. Schultz on this honor," Rehder said. "It is an acknowledgment of her hard work and talent, as well as a valuable opportunity to broaden her horizons through international study."

The Brad Henry International Scholarship program was established by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education in June 2008. The Regents provide a stipend for students selected to participate in the semester-long study or research programs affiliated with Swansea University. Recipients are selected by a committee of State Regents' staff based on their excellent academic performance, outstanding communication skills, exemplary character, and exceptional leadership, maturity and judgment.
